MoorHeart Recognition: Troy and Diane DeLeon

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to recognize and honor Troy and Diane DeLeon with the MoorHeart award.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The MoorHeart award recognizes individuals and organizations that go above and beyond to demonstrate community within our City by their actions and service. A team of volunteers from type deards and commissions (Corps mount cathiog) at City Council meetings. The MoorHeart selection committee chose to recognize Troy and Diane for their generosity created by their work with the historic Moorhead Dairy Queen.

Troy and Diane DeLeon took over the Moorhead Dairy Queen in 1995. The Moorhead Dairy Queen is special to the Moorhead area. With specialty menu items and often long lines because of its popularity, Troy and Diane create a caring and welcoming environment throughout the spring and summer season. They get involved with and give back to the community through promotions at the Dairy Queen and their dedication, passion, and humility for the Moorhead community amaze us all.

Lisa Bode and Scott Kostohryz wrote in nominations: "The Historic Moorhead Dairy Queen is celebrating its 75th anniversary in 2024. The Moorhead location opened August 1, 1949, as one of the original stores in the Dairy Queen system. It was known for its ice cream and handmade treats, as well as the pride the original owners, Bob and Phyllis Litherland, had in serving the community of Moorhead. Upon their retirement in 1995, the Litherlands sold the Historic Moorhead Dairy Queen to Troy and Diane DeLeon. The DeLeons have maintained and expanded the recipes, traditions, and excellent service foundation. The Moorhead Dairy Queen, a beloved institution, thrives today.

For decades, the State of Minnesota and the Towards Zero Deaths traffic safety program have provided national Dairy Queen sponsored "I Got Caught" coupons to police agencies throughout Minnesota. These coupons are given by police officers to youth who are wearing helmets while riding bikes, scooters or other recreational conveyance. This piece of paper was good for a free ice cream cone at any Minnesota Dairy Queen, but it was much more than that. This interaction was not only a positive experience for the child, but also an opportunity for the officers across the state to have a positive interaction with the kids.

In 2023, the Office of Traffic Safety notified agencies that they were discontinuing the program due to lack of funding. The DeLeons were approached in the Fall of 2023 and were asked if they would continue this program locally if private funding was provided. They took full control of this idea and not only agreed to it but provided 2000 coupons at no cost for Clay County agencies to continue this tradition. In addition, they coordinated with all Clay County Dairy Queens to ensure they would honor the coupons as well, at no cost. This act of kindness ensures a beloved tradition stays here in Clay County and local law enforcement has a way to maintain positive reinforcement for safe youth bicyclists and continued positive interaction with our officers. This is on top of all the great things the DeLeons do to provide a fun community atmosphere and Moorhead pride."

The dedication and commitment of Troy and Diane have significantly enriched our downtown neighborhood, providing not only a welcoming environment but also fostering a sense of community, providing Moorhead with experiences, memories, and delicious treats. Thank you

Mayor and Council Reports

Council member White reported the West Central Initiative Legacy Revolving Loan Fund and the CARES Act Loan Fund have resources available. Council member White attended multiple events in Gooseberry Park, including Inclusive Moorhead and the International Potluck's community picnic as well as a Conversation with Ward 3 Council members on July 11. Council member White attended a community open house for the Heartland Trail. She also invited the public to participate in FM Pride events taking place August 8-11 in the metro area.

First Reading of Ordinance 2024-09: An Ordinance to Rezone 4020 35th Ave S (Parcel 58.900.2310) from TZ: Transitional to MU-2: Neighborhood Mixed Use

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a First Reading of Ordinance 2024-09: An Ordinance to Rezone 4020 35th Ave S (Parcel 58.900.2310) from TZ: Transitional to MU-2: Neighborhood Mixed Use.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The applicant is requesting the rezone to facilitate housing development and this parcel has been identified for mixed use land use in the 2022 Onward Moorhead! Comprehensive Plan. The site can support up to 40 residential dwelling units with existing infrastructure.

This parcel is currently zoned TZ: Transitional, which is a placeholder for annexed properties until they are developed. This property was annexed in 2006 and multi-family development is a compatible use in this mixed use area (residential/golf course to the west, industrial/commercial to the east and commercial to the south). Whereas a final site plan has not been approved at this point, the applicant has indicated development of townhomes or senior apartments.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on August 5, 2024 and unanimously recommended approval of the rezoning. Several public comments were received from residents from the adjacent neighborhood including concerns about density, appearance, increased crime and traffic, safety at the 34th Ave S/Hwy 52 intersection, drainage, disruption to their quiet enjoyment of the area and comments that there is enough multi-family in Moorhead and there are better suited areas in Moorhead for this type of use.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP IN ACCORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 3 OF TITLE 10 OF THE MOORHEAD CITY CODE REZONING 4020 35TH AVENUE SOUTH (PARCEL 58.900.2310) FROM TZ: TRANSITIONAL TO MU-2: NEIGHBORHOOD MIXED USE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOORHEAD AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, Barrier Homes, Inc. has requested to rezone 4020 35th Avenue S (Parcel 58.900.2310) from TZ: Transitional to MU-2: Neighborhood Mixed Use, legally described as:

WHEREAS, the Moorhead Planning Commission held a public hearing on August 5, 2024 regarding said rezoning and voted unanimously to recommend approval; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Moorhead finds pursuant to the purpose and intent found in Title 10, Chapter 3 of the Moorhead City Code that the proposed rezoning of property would promote health, safety and general welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Moorhead, Minnesota that the Official Zoning Map of the City of Moorhead, in accordance with Chapter 3 of Title 10 of the City Code of Moorhead, Minnesota is hereby amended to rezone 4020 35th Avenue S (Parcel 58.900.2310) from TZ: Transitional to MU-2: Neighborhood Mixed Use, described as:

SUBJECT:

First Reading of Ordinance 2024-07: An Ordinance to Amend and Reenact Title 3, Chapter 7, Section 10, Animals Prohibited in City, of the Moorhead Municipal Code Relating to the Keeping of Chickens

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a First Reading of Ordinance 2024-07: An Ordinance to amend and reenact Title 3, Chapter 7, Section 10, Animals Prohibited in City, of the Moorhead Municipal Code relating to the Keeping of Chickens.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The current chicken ordinance was adopted in 2023 allowing residents to keep up to six chickens with a permit. Throughout the past year, feedback from residents and research into chicken best practices have highlighted opportunities for updates to the code.

The following are the main updates:

- 1. Enlarged Run Area Currently, the run area must be a minimum of 4-10 sf per chicken. The proposed change would increase this minimum to 15 sf per chicken with a maximum run area capped at 200 sf for all areas except RLD-1, where there would be no run maximum (Oakport and Americana Estates annexation areas).
- 2. Increase Number of Chickens To accommodate requests from residents in the Oakport area, the proposed amendment would divide permits into a Tier I and Tier II permit.
 - Tier I would be available to all residents who meet the requirements for keeping chickens.
 - Tier II would allow RLD-1 properties with lot areas of at least 1 acre to keep up to twelve chickens.
- 3. Fencing and Screening To provide more flexibility for residents, the proposed amendment would allow chain-link fencing in addition to solid fencing, provided the chain-link fence is screened by landscaping.
 - This requirement would be waived for RLD-1 properties.
 - Clarifications have also been made for permitted and prohibited fence materials.
- 4. Coop & Run Materials Clarifications have been made for permitted and prohibited materials.
- 5. Run Height Adjusted from 6 to 7 feet to be consistent with the maximum coop height.



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- 6. Free-range chickens Added language to allow chickens to roam on permitted property outside coop/run as long as they are contained.
- 7. Existing permits Those with approved permits would not be required to make any modifications based on the proposed code changes.

Currently, there are 20 active chicken permits with five complaints made in 2023 for non-permitted chickens.

Moorhead Police has reviewed the proposed amendments and had no comment.

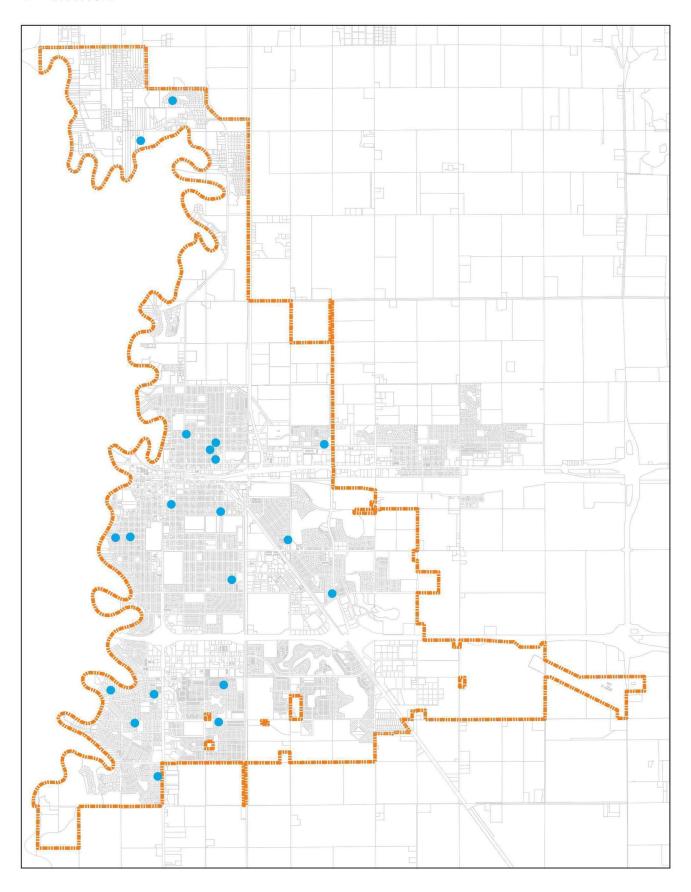

ORDINANCE 2024-07

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND REENACT TITLE 3, CHAPTER 7, SECTION 10, ANIMALS PROHIBITED IN CITY, OF THE MOORHEAD MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO KEEPING OF CHICKENS

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Moorhead as follows:

NEW DELETE

SECTION 1. Title 3, Chapter 7, Section 10, Animals Prohibited in City, of the Moorhead Municipal Code is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows (unchanged portions of this chapter have been omitted from the text below):

3-7-10: ANIMALS PROHIBITED IN CITY:

. . .

- B. Keeping of Chickens: It is unlawful for any person to own, control, keep, maintain, or harbor chickens on any premises within the city unless that person has a permit to do so as provided in this chapter. A permit will not be issued for the keeping or harboring of more the six (6) chickens on any premises. The keeping or harboring of male chickens or roosters is prohibited.
- 1. Permit: A person shall not maintain a coop or run unless granted a permit by the city. The permit is subject to all terms and conditions of this chapter and any additional conditions deemed necessary by the city to protect public health, safety, and welfare.
- a. Annual Permit: Permits will not exceed one (1) year and are subject to annual renewal. The initial permit automatically expires at the end of the initial calendar year and, thereafter, renewals of said permit extend for calendar-year periods. The annual permit fee is set by resolution of the City Council, as amended from time to time.
- b. Permit Requirements: An application for a permit includes a complete application with a scaled diagram that indicates the location of the coop and run, approximate size and distance of the coop and run from adjoining structures and property lines, the number and species of chickens to be maintained at the premises, and a signed statement that the applicant will, at all times, keep the chickens in accordance with this chapter and comply with all the conditions within the application and permit. Failure to comply with said conditions, or modification thereof, will constitute a violation of the provisions of this chapter and are grounds for revocation or suspension of the permit. Chickens may be slaughtered on the premises, out of view of the general public and only if for consumption by the occupants of the premises.
- c. A property with three (3) or more residential dwelling units, commercial, mixed use, and industrial properties is prohibited from keeping chickens.
- 2. Confinement: A person who owns, controls, keeps, maintains, or harbors chickens must keep them confined at all times in a coop and run and may not allow the chickens to run at large. Chickens must be secured in a chicken coop from sunset to sunrise each day.
- a. The following conditions apply to both coops and runs:
 - (1) Must not be located within the front yard;
 - (2) Must be setback a minimum of three (3) feet from any adjacent structures;
 - (3) Must be setback a minimum of ten (10) feet from all property lines;
 - (4) Must not be located on any public easements;
- (5) Must be a minimum of four (4) square feet per chicken and may not exceed ten (10) square feet per chicken;
- (6) Fencing for coops and runs may not exceed six (6) feet in total height from adjacent ground level;
 - (7) Must not be located in any part of a dwelling unit or garage;
- (8) Feed must be kept within a coop, run, shed or garage and must be kept in animal proof containers; and

- (9) Manure must be removed frequently, and use of quality bedding material is recommended. Manure which is not properly disposed of and/or causes odor issues will result in revocation of the permit.
- (10) To provide a buffer from adjacent properties, Coops and runs shall be enclosed by a solid opaque fence or wall measuring a minimum of five feet (5') in height and not more than four inches (4") from the ground or other surface. A solid opaque fence or wall around the rear yard that meet these measurements, shall also be sufficient to meet this requirement.
 - b. The following conditions apply to coops:
- (1) Must be either elevated with a clear open space of at least sixteen (16) inches between the ground surface and grading/floor of the coop or;
 - (2) Must not exceed seven (7) feet in total height from adjacent ground level;
- (3) May be a commercially purchased chicken coop that substantially conforms with the requirements of this ordinance. Substantially conforms means that it may not differ more or less than twenty percent (20%) of the noted chicken coop standards.
- (4) The coop floor, foundation and footings must be constructed using rodent resistant construction.
 - c. The following apply to runs:
 - (1) Must not exceed ten (10) square feet per chicken;
 - (2) Fencing must not exceed six (6) feet in total height from adjacent ground level; and
 - (3) May be enclosed with wood, woven wire materials, or a combination thereof.
- 3. Conditions and Inspections: A person who owns, controls, keeps, maintains, or harbors chickens must not permit the premises where the chickens are kept to be maintained in an unhealthy, unsanitary, or noxious condition or to permit the premises to be in such condition that noxious odors are carried to adjacent properties. Any coop or run authorized by permit under this chapter may be inspected at any reasonable time by the animal control officer, law enforcement officer, public health official, or other employee or agent of the city.
- 4. Private Restrictions/Covenants: A permit issued to a person whose premises is subject to private restrictions and/or covenants that prohibit the keeping of chickens is the sole responsibility of the person applying for the permit. The interpretation and enforcement of the private restrictions and/or covenants is the sole responsibility of the private parties involved, the city is in no way responsible for interpreting or enforcing private restrictions and/or covenants.
- 5. Refusal to Grant Permit: The city may refuse to grant or renew a permit to keep or maintain chickens for failure to comply with the provisions of this chapter, submitting an inaccurate or incomplete application, failure to comply with permit conditions, creation of a nuisance condition, or if the public health and safety is unreasonably endangered by the granting or renewing of such permit. Any coop or run constructed or maintained on any premises must be removed from said premises within thirty (30) days after the suspension, expiration, or revocation of the permit for said premises or after a period of thirty (30) days from which chickens have not been lawfully kept on the premises.
- 6. Suspension and Appeal: A permit for keeping of chickens may be revoked or suspended by the city for any violation of this chapter following written notice or, upon request for renewal, the renewal permit may be refused by the city. The applicant may appeal the revocation, suspension, or refusal to renew the permit to the city clerk by requesting a hearing before the City Council within seven (7) days of the date of the notice. The City Council shall hear testimony from the permittee and city staff and render a decision on the matter or request additional information.
- 7. Violation: A person who owns, controls, keeps, maintains, or harbors chickens without obtaining or maintaining a current permit or after a permit has been suspended or revoked is guilty of an infraction as provided under City Code §§ 1-4-2 and 1-4-4.
- 8. A person who had a permit to harbor chickens and who no longer harbors chickens must remove any related structures (coop, run, or other) within ten (10) days of no longer harboring chickens.

. . .

- B. Keeping of Chickens: It is unlawful for any person to own, control, keep, maintain, or harbor chickens on any premises within the city unless that person has a permit to do so as provided in this chapter. The keeping or harboring of male chickens or roosters is prohibited.
- 1. Permit: A person shall not maintain a coop or run unless granted a permit by the city. The permit is subject to all terms and conditions of this chapter and any additional conditions deemed necessary by the city to protect public health, safety, and welfare.
- a. Annual Permit: Permits will not exceed one (1) year and are subject to annual renewal. The initial permit automatically expires at the end of the initial calendar year and, thereafter, renewals of said permit extend for calendar-year periods. The annual permit fee is set by resolution of the City Council, as amended from time to time.
 - b. Number of chickens:
- i. Tier I Permit: One to Six (1 6) chickens: Permit may be issued to any property which meets the requirements for keeping chickens.
- <u>ii. Tier II Permit: Seven to Twelve (7 12) chickens: Permit may be issued to properties zoned RLD-1: Residential Low Density 1 with a lot size of one (1) acre or greater which meets the requirements for keeping chickens.</u>
 - c. Permit Requirements: A completed application for a permit includes:
 - i. Applicant and property information;
 - ii. The number and species of chickens to be maintained at the premise;
 - iii. A signed statement that the applicant will, at all times, keep the chickens in accordance with this chapter and comply with all the conditions within the application and permit. Failure to comply with said conditions, or modification thereof, will constitute a violation of the provisions of this chapter and are grounds for the revocation or suspension of the permit.
 - iv. Fee
 - v. A scaled drawing with the following:
 - a. The location and dimensions of the coop, run, fence and landscape screening (where required):
 - b. Approximate distance of the coop and run from adjoining structures and property lines;
 - c. <u>If coop or run is intended to be moveable, indicate area or areas where they may</u> be moved:
- d. A property with three (3) or more residential dwelling units or zoned for commercial, mixed-use, institutional, or industrial use is prohibited from keeping chickens.
 - i. Exception: Single and two-family homes in mixed-use districts may keep chickens.
 - 2. Chickens may be slaughtered on the premises if out of view of the general public and only for consumption by the occupants of the premises.
 - 3. Confinement: A person who owns, controls, keeps, maintains, or harbors chickens must keep them confined in a coop and/or run and may not allow the chickens to run at large, which means chickens roaming off permitted property.
 - a. Exception: Chickens may roam outside of their coop or run within yards with perimeter fencing or coop/run perimeter fencing between sunrise and sunset with adult supervision.

- 1. Exception: Properties in RLD-1: Residential Low Density 1 are exempt from fence/screening requirements except that chickens that roam outside of coop/run must roam in a contained area.

Resolution to Approve Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Climate Action Grant and Related Agreement for the Replacement of Turf Grass Areas Along the Red River Corridor (Budget Adjustment #24-026)

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a resolution to approve a grant from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to replace approximately 10 acres of turf grass with natural plantings along the Red River corridor.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The City of Moorhead has been awarded a Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Climate Action Grant for \$14,200 to convert 10 acres of existing turf grass areas along the Red River corridor area to natural plantings. The select areas are all along the Red River corridor near these select avenues:

- 11th Avenue South
- 14th Avenue South
- I-94
- 34th Avenue South
- 46th Avenue South

The City in collaboration with local partners has been converting turf grass to natural plantings along the Red River over the past few years. The natural plantings are supported by both the River Corridor Master Plan and Onward Moorhead Comprehensive Plan.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The City of Moorhead is required to provide a local match of \$17,240. The local match will include purchasing chemicals (to kill the grass), tilling, and in house labor and equipment costs for the removal of turf grass. The chemicals and tilling will be funded through the River Corridor Capital Improvement fund.

Grant:\$14,200 Chemicals: \$3,500 Tilling: \$7,500

In House Labor and Equipment (spray); \$6,240

Budget Adjustment #24-026 is outlined below. The local match expenses will be funded through the River Corridor Capital Improvement budget and with in-kind staff resources.

Resolution to Approve Vacation of a portion of a Prescriptive Right-of Way Easement near Village Green South First Addition

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a Vacation of a portion of a 50-foot Prescriptive Right-of-Way Easement for former County State Aid Highway 7 near Village Green South First Addition.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The request is to accommodate a proposed residential development 4020 35th Ave S (Parcel 589002310).

Before the current configuration of 40th St S and 35th Ave S, 40th St S/CSAH 7 connected to Hwy 52 as a gravel roadway at the north end of this parcel. Around the same time as the 2006 annexation of this parcel, a new intersection was constructed to line up with 34th Ave S on the east side of Hwy 52 and designated as the new CSAH 7. These changes were made to address safety concerns and improve traffic flow.

Due to this reconfiguration, the CSAH 7 gravel roadway was removed and the remainder of 35th Ave S was turned over to City jurisdiction. This right-of-way easement area currently exists as greenspace which is maintained by Public Works. If vacated, the right-of-way easement area will be transferred to the adjacent parcel to the east and will be the responsibility of the property owner to maintain.

The City will maintain 80 feet of right-of-way along 35th Ave S. In this area there is 65 feet currently, therefore, the City will only agree to a 35-foot vacation of the eastern portion of the right-of way easement instead of the requested 50 feet. The area to the north of 35th Ave S, the full 50 feet requested can be vacated (see attached map).

The Moorhead Planning Commission considered the request at their August 5, 2024 meeting and unanimously recommended approval of the Vacation with no public comment. The complete Planning Commission packet is available at: <u>City of Moorhead</u>: <u>Planning Commission</u>

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The City will no longer bear the cost of mowing the vacated easement area.

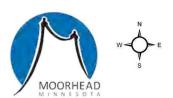

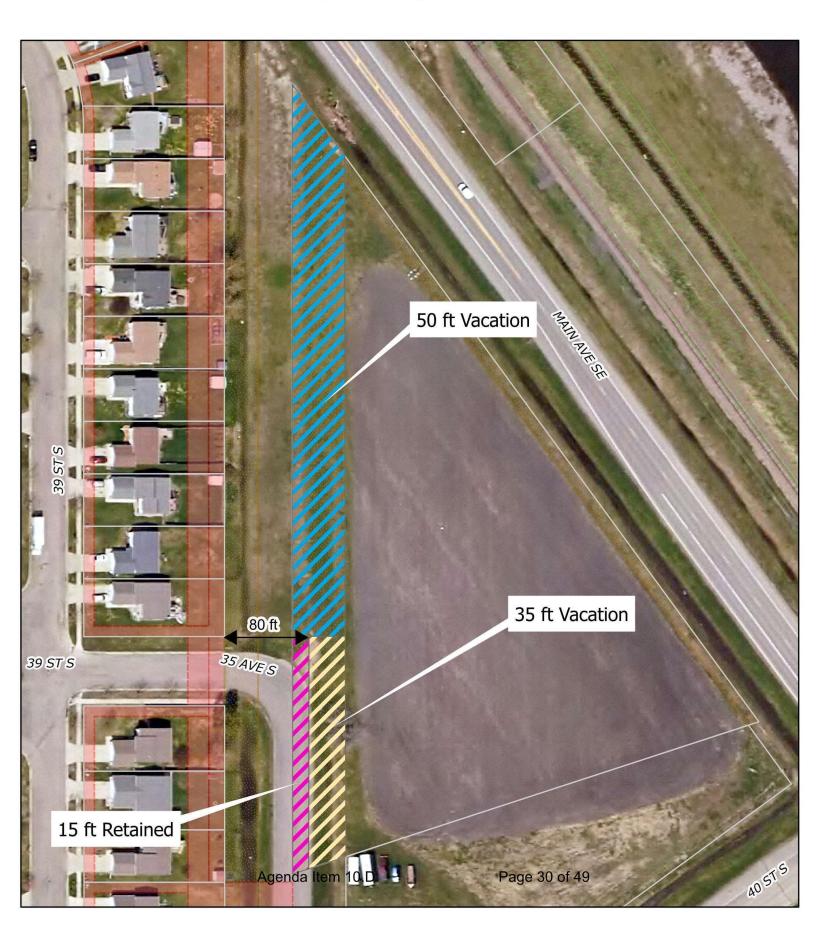

Resolution Approving 2024 Alternative Urban Areawide Review (AUAR) Updates for North, East and South Moorhead Growth Areas

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a resolution to approve the 2024 Alternative Urban Areawide Review Updates for the North, East and South Moorhead Growth Areas.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

Moorhead has three growth areas to the North, East and South. Alternative Urban Areawide Reviews for these growth areas are required to be updated approximately every five years or when growth areas are amended or significantly change. AUAR updates were last completed in 2018 for these growth areas. Prior to that, updates were completed in 2013 for the South and East Growth Areas and the first AUAR was completed for the North Growth Area in 2009. Comprehensive Plans, Growth Area Plans and past and current AUARs are available at: City of Moorhead: Long Range Planning

Since the creation of the original growth area boundaries in 2005 for the South and East and 2009 for the North, development has occurred within areas now in city limits but originally outside city limits when the growth area was created. Little development has occurred outside the 2018 city boundaries except for the 2020 annexation of 825 46th Ave S (Storemoor Self Storage) and the 2021 annexation of 1444 40th Ave S (existing single-family home).

AUARs are authorized under Minnesota Rules Chapter 4410.3610 as an alternative form of environmental review for anticipated residential, commercial, and light industrial development projects and associated infrastructure. An AUAR does not commit the City to expand infrastructure or utilities, but ensures that environmental impacts of cumulative area development is accounted for and managed. AUARs also assist the development community by providing advanced environmental planning.

A Comprehensive Plan, along with an approved AUAR, also assists in the continued growth and development of the city and also assists the Engineering Department, Moorhead Public Service and other utility companies by providing an analysis of infrastructure expansion and associated impacts on infrastructure.

Upon completion of an AUAR, most residential, commercial and light industrial development projects and associated infrastructure within the designated areas that are consistent with the assumptions and plan for mitigation are exempt from additional environmental review.

The Moorhead Planning Commission reviewed the AUARs at their July 1, 2024 meeting and unanimously recommended approval. The complete Planning Commission packet is available at: <u>City of Moorhead : Planning Commission</u>

The City Council approved the order for the AUARs at their July 8, 2024 meeting and the draft documents were submitted typ (b) ordered a Council approved to 2024 until August 12, 2024.

No objections were received but comments were received from both the MPCA and DNR as follows:

Documents were found to be well done and they appreciated that the documents addressed all potential impacts, especially surface water, ground water and climate adoption and resilience, and that they referred to MPCA's 2024 impaired waters list and Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategies (WRAPS) reports for the Buffalo River and Upper Red River of the North watersheds.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider Guaranteed Maximum Price Amendment #1 to the Agreement with Gast Construction Company, Inc. for Manager at Risk Services on the Reimagine Romkey Park – Pool Replacement and Park Renovation Project.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

On May 28, 2024, the City Council authorized and agreement with Gast Construction for the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) for the Reimagine Romkey Park – Pool Replacement and Park Renovation Project. The CMAR operates as the owner's representative to manage the construction process, providing pre-construction services in the design phase and construction services during the construction phase. The CMAR oversees all bidding, subcontractor hiring, oversight of the construction, and health and safety measures for the project. To provide the construction services, the construction manager provides a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) for the project based on the construction documents and specifications provided by the Design team. The GMP is provided as an amendment to the current contract.

The Reimagine Romkey Project is scheduled to perform demolition the fall of 2024 and perform substantial construction during 2025. For efficient construction and scheduling, it is proposed to have two bid packages with two GMPs related to the CMAR Agreement. The first bid package will include demolition of the existing facilities, construction of foundation footings, and limited earthwork. The proposed resolution authorizes a Guaranteed Maximum Price Amendment #1 to the Gast Agreement with a "not to exceed" GMP for the first bid package. The first bid package is anticipated to be released in August and the second bid package when full design is complete. This resolution will authorize a maximum GMP and assist with quickly moving into construction if the GMP is consistent with the proposed estimates.

The GMP Amendment #1 to the agreement with Gast Construction Company Inc. will be reviewed by the City Attorney prior to execution by the Mayor and City Manager.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The City of Moorhead has been working toward the construction of a new grandstand for the Matson Field Stadium Project. With the knowledge that there is an active fundraising campaign in Fall of 2023, Mutchler Bartram Architects (MBA) was selected to design the project. The design was completed and includes many new amenities.

The fundraising campaign has raised \$1,232,000 for the project. The original project estimates were \$2,100,000. Due to timeline constraints, staff recommends proceeding with construction of a reduced scope that will allow phasing of the grandstand construction. The proposed phase of construction will match the current funding available. The project will include construction of an elevated concrete grandstand, press box, and backstop netting system. The project design will accommodate future amenities such as restrooms, concessions, and shade structures.

The City Council is asked to proceed with a Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) delivery of the project. The CMAR will perform work as the owner's representative and provide construction phase services. The CMAR will provide a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) for the project based on the construction documents and specifications provided by the Architect/Engineering team. Upon acceptance of the GMP, the CMAR will provide construction services for the construction phase by overseeing all biding, subcontractor hiring, job oversight, insurance, and health/safety measures for the project.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The current project funding is \$1,232,000 and has been from various sources including donations from the Convention and Visitors Bureau, the American Legion, Alex Stern Foundation, and funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.

The proposed resolution will authorize advertisement for CMAR services and does not have financial impact.
